She is proud to show her daughters that anything is possible if you put the work in.

Melissa grew up on a small farm and always enjoyed working with her hands. She didn't attend college right after school. She spent many years working many different jobs but was never quite satisfied. She finally decided to attend college after a considerable amount of time off school. She attended Georgian College in Owen Sound and graduated from the Welding Techniques program. She worked as a welder at a farm equipment manufacturer. The business was sold so it was then that she applied to the posting for a millwright apprentice with Bruce Power. She was fortunate enough to get hired and start her new career in a very rewarding trade. She is now into her third year of the apprenticeship and will be writing her certificate of qualification this year to obtain her red seal.

Diane participated in the Women in Trades and Technology program. That's where she first learned what Millwrighting was. She applied to Sarnia Millwrights, wrote the aptitude test and was hired after her interview. She was hired full time at Bruce Power in March 2007 and became a mechanical maintainer on the tools until January 2013 when she switched to the role of a mechanical planner.
