

Participants answers


- To be able to offer more options to our learners.

- It worked well with my schedule.




- There was a lot of self-study and reading materials. I found it very boring and mundane.

Have your learners ever participated in blended learning programs?








Which blended learning options are offered to your learners?

POLL RESULTS




- Online learning material (pre-recorded lectures or courses, online quizzes, etc.)

Participants answers

- To offer more teaching styles and accommodate more learning styles.
- To offer the opportunity to work with another practitioner.
- To provide students with another way to engage with the material.
- To keep training interesting.
- To offer students more hours of training and increased flexibility.
- To familiarize our students with the learning management system they would be working with if they moved on to post-secondary at our college.
- To offer courses that were not part of our program.





What are the barriers that are preventing you to register your learners for blended learning programs such as online courses?

Participants answers

- Lack of computer or Internet access.
- Not sure if the learners will complete their courses.
- Lack of computer skills (for learners and instructors).
- Couldn't find desired courses.
- Unfamiliar territory for LBS staff.
- Not sure what options are available to the learners.
- Don't know how to stay in contact with online instructors.
- Learners with low literacy skills find they need more support.
- Sometimes registration is difficult for students.
- Lack of learner motivation.

@ How can you make blended learning a positive experience for your learners?

@How can you make blended learning a positive experience for yourself as an instructor?







- Offer them a course they are interested in.
 - Have good knowledge of what is available for courses so you can tailor the learning to the learner in terms of literacy level, interest, goal path, etc.
- Use tools such as videos and step-by-step instructions showing learners how to use the platform.
- Have someone available (preferably in person) to help troubleshoot technical issues.
- Offer online courses to a small group with an in class instructor.
- Advise the learners on how this is beneficial within their goal.







- Give them more exposure to technology (computers, tablets) so they feel more comfortable to take online courses.
- Help learners with course material when difficulties arise.
- Take an interest in what they are working on.
- Have the learners come into the classroom to do the online course.
 - Make sure the learning centre has good computers, quality internet, and hours that work for the learners.
 - Offer open computer lab time to learners (drop in style).
- Make sure the learners know where they can access computers in the community.







- Create peer-support / peer-mentoring systems.
- Encourage them to use the computer and tell them that they can't break it. ^(C)
- Allow the learners to observe online learning before hand so they can see it's not so scary.
- Familiarize students with accessibility features.
- Get learners to participate in an "Introduction to online learning course" (orientation to online learning).







- Try a course so that you know how to help them.
 - Field test the system before the learners are exposed to it so that you know how to guide them into it with the least issues.
- Take an interest in what they are working on.
- Ask feedback from students.
- Engage with the delivery organization so that you have a contact for issues and can get some feedback.
 - Build a relationship with the online instructor so that you are virtually a team.
 - Share helpful digital and blended learning resources between instructors.







- Have a backup plan in case of big technical issues.
- Give online service provider a heads up when you want to take a course to sample.
- Get volunteer tutors to help with this type of program.
- Participate in an "Introduction to online learning course" (orientation to online learning)





Recap

@ What will you take away from all of these discussions?

- → There are tons of good resources out there to support learners and instructors.
- → To engage with e-channel service providers.
- → How important it is to engage with learners to keep their interest.
- → Learners will make faster progress!
- → Blended learning is more possible for all learners and taking the time to help the learners will be beneficial for the learners and myself. It opens doors for learners.







- @ After all that we've discussed, what can blended learning offer to you centre?
- → It can free up a group instructor enabling them to spend time with one student knowing the other is busy.
- → It can offer access to a broader array of resources for our learners; and it also equips our learners to function in an increasingly digitized world.

- Provide a more fulsome learning experience and the learners will feel more comfortable working in the digital environment. It is providing "real world" experience.
- Help with flexibility for learner schedules.
- Prepare learners for future learning.
